Scott Vetoes Zoo Lease Bill

Giraffes, zebras and rhinos won't be roaming Florida's parks—not yet anyway. Late Friday, April 6th, Governor Rick Scott vetoed a bill that had been pushed by Lowry Park Zoo officials that would have allowed zoos to lease state land to create breeding herds of everything from gazelles to elephants. But Scott said one reason he vetoed it is because the law already allows the state to lease land to anyone—even zoos.

Scott signed 80 bills into law Friday, including the zoo lease bill. In a letter explaining why he rejected the zoo bill, HB 1117, dubbed the "Jurassic Park bill" by environmental activists—Scott wrote that it "lacks sufficient safeguards" to "ensure the protection of state lands, native species, and habitats".

Also, Scott wrote, he believes the law already allows the governor and Cabinet and the five water management districts to lease state lands "for any use" that doesn't violate the state Constitution. Scott's veto delighted Laurie MacDonald of Defenders of Wildlife, who said it "protects our public lands and it protects our native wildlife". But the bill's sponsor, Rep. Shawn Harrison, R-Temple Terrace, said he didn't mind the veto because Scott assured him personally that the law already allows state officials to lease land to the zoos. They just haven't done it yet.

I'm happy.....that we've brought attention to the fact that Florida law already allows this to happen," Harrison said. "We will be watching very closely any applications for this use" McDonald warned. The bill had been pushed by Lowry Park Zoo vice president Larry Killmar, who is president of the Florida Association of Zoos and Aquariums. He said Friday that the group will now "certainly plot forward" toward finding state lands it is interested in leasing.

The main reason the zoos wanted the land is to have room to create large breeding populations of exotic animals, Killmar said during the legislative session. Without that, he explained, "We're like a shoe store with no warehouse. Our inventory is everything that is on display."

Critics of the bill said that turning exotic wildlife loose on state land would displace the native wildlife and even destroy habitat. They also questioned what would happen if there was an escape such as the one five years ago when a Siberian tiger got loose at Lowry Park Zoo and had to be shot.

CEQ GUIDANCE ON NEPA REVIEW AND STREAMLINING

The Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) has issued its guidance on "Improving the Process for Preparing Efficient and Timely Environmental Reviews under the National Environmental Policy Act," that was circulated for public review and comment from December 13, 2011 through January 27, 2012. This Guidance is part of the ongoing efforts to modernize the NEPA process and expedite the permitting and other environmental decisions involved in the development of needed infrastructure projects. The Education Research & Science Working Group has collaborated with CEQ and the U.S. Forest Service to develop a webinar that will provide guidance for preparing concise and technically and procedurally adequate environmental documentation that complies with the National Environmental Policy Act. The webinar will consider pragmatic approaches such as the effective use of the scoping process to identify and integrate the NEPA process with other applicable statutes and regulations.

Horst Greczmiel, CEQ associate director for NEPA oversight, will provide an overview of the guidance that outlines techniques and practices provided by the CEQ NEPA Regulations for agencies and practitioners for focusing and producing effective environmental documents and the related NEPA review in less time. Mr. Greczmiel will be joined by Mr. Joe Carbone, Assistant Director for the National Environmental Policy Act, in the Ecosystem Management Coordination Branch of the U.S. Forest Service. Mr. Carbone will share the work U.S. Forest Service has advanced in the spirit of the Guidance.

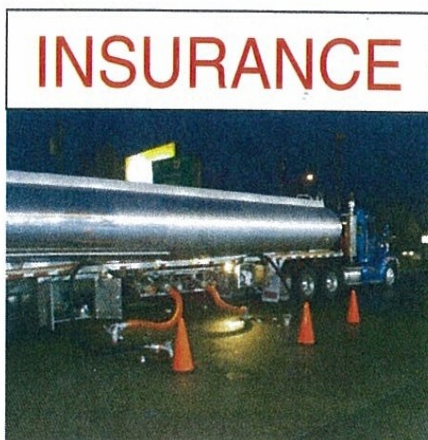

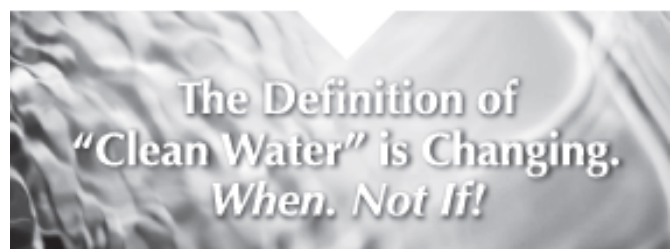
